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#### **Follow-Up Activities:**

- 1) You might consider having a class discussion the first day of school where students can ask any questions they have about school or express their concerns. Alternatively, you might try to anticipate any of these questions or concerns and talk about them. An emphasis on respect, for both people and property, should be worked throughout this discussion.
- 2) After students have seen this DVD, relate the DVD to their actual classroom and people in their school. Consider having a bulletin board set up with other teachers' and workers' names, and where they're located. If possible, pictures of the people to go with their names would help the students.
- 3) You might consider having books on hand either to read to your students or for them to read. Some good choices are: *The Berenstain Bears Go to School* by Stan and Jan Berenstain; *Annabelle Swift, Kindergartner* by Amy Schwartz; *First Day Jitters* by Julie Dannenberg; and *I Am Absolutely Too Small for School* by Lauren Child.
- 4) You could set up a bulletin board with important rules and manners, such as always saying "please" and "thank you," learning about bathroom and lunchroom behavior, being respectful to people and property, and so on. You might consider reviewing these rules often in the beginning of the year and again after any incidents.

# **My School Building**

This DVD focuses on people (in the school) and places (the school building). Jake and "Buddy" take a tour of the main school offices and other interesting places found at his school. As they visit each one, Jake learns that there are important rules that can help him to be a good student. His new friend "Buddy" tells him that respect for others and staying safe are also very important elements of this new school community.

When children are going to school for the first time or to a new school, they are naturally curious and perhaps nervous about what they will encounter. This DVD gives them a glimpse into what a typical school building looks like, helping to prepare them for what they can expect. Children will learn the main places in the school building and the roles of the people who work there

This DVD is designed to provide children with background knowledge so that what seems scary because it is strange or unknown becomes more familiar, and, therefore, less scary. Children will learn that school is a safe and important place away from home and going to school is their primary responsibility.

#### **Program Objectives**

After viewing the program, students should understand

- · what the main office is
- that they learn and practice physical education in the gymnasium
- that a nurse has an office where she dispenses routine medicines and takes care of sick students
- · how they should conduct themselves in the hallway
- that schools have lavatories and the rules for using them
- that schools have libraries or media centers run by librarians
- that they eat in a cafeteria and how they should behave
- · people and their responsibilities at the school

# **VOCABULARY:**

**Auditorium:** a place where the whole school comes together for assemblies.

Cafeteria: lunchroom; place to eat lunch.

**Gymnasium:** a huge room where you go to play basketball and learn other ways to exercise and stay fit.

**Janitor:** the person in the school who cleans and repairs things.

Lavatory: bathroom.

**Library:** a place to borrow or read books and use computers.

**Physical education:** learning ways to get exercise and stay fit.

Principal: the person in charge of the school.
